### [Mr John Flowerdew-report regarding Septic tank proposal](#) – **Nutrient neutrality**

7. Mr Flowerdew updated the parishioners about the current situation on the River Wensum and how septic tanks deliver approximately 1 kilo of phosphates just from one household, which goes directly into our waterways. Part of Tittleshall flows into the river Wensum.

It was confirmed that Anglian water plants can't remove phosphates from the water, so the proposal is to change septic tanks to a more environmentally friendly scheme. The Wensum catchment partnerships are working hard to obtain grant money to replace septic tanks free for residents with the only cost being the electricity to run the new environmental tanks, approximately £120-£150 per year. Hopefully, funding will be announced this week. There could be means-tested funding to help with the additional electricity cost.
